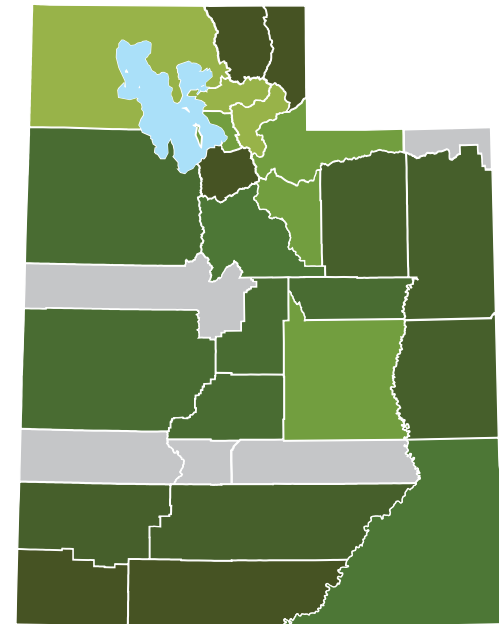

In 2024, the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation provided funding to nonprofits across all 29 counties in Utah, with a particular focus on supporting rural communities. While our impact reaches statewide, we awarded grants to organizations based in 24 of Utah's 29 counties and continue to work toward supporting every county throughout the state.

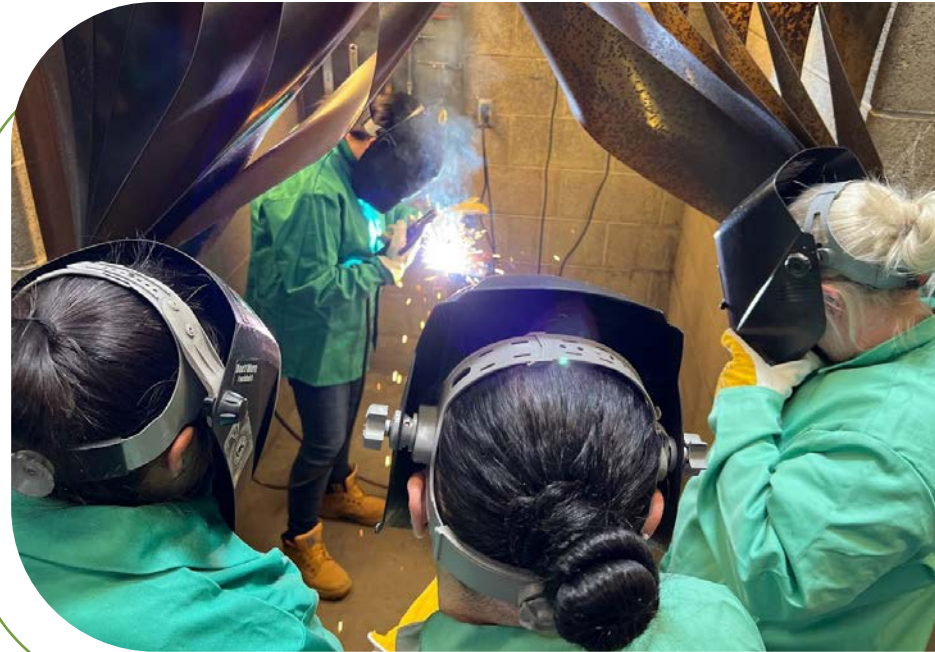


TURNING SURPLUS INTO SUSTENANCE

Approximately 400,000 Utahns experience food insecurity, while up to 40% of purchased food goes to waste. **WasteLess** addresses both challenges by rescuing surplus food from businesses, grocery stores and caterers and redistributing it to those in need. With support from a 2024 GO Grant from the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation, their efforts saved 507,273 pounds of food—equivalent to 422,728 meals—helping to reduce waste and combat hunger statewide.

UTAH WOMEN IN TRADES

Utah Women in Trades empowers women to enter and excel in industries traditionally occupied by men, such as plumbing, electrical and HVAC. A GO Grant from the Miller Family Foundation upgraded staff capabilities to provide increased hands-on training, mentorship and apprenticeship opportunities.



SUPPORT FOR RURAL YOUTH

Sevier Valley Youth Refuge provides mentorship, recreation and service opportunities for youth in Richfield, Utah, and the surrounding counties of Sevier, Juab, Sanpete, Millard and Beaver. With support from the Miller Family Foundation, the organization expanded outreach efforts and enhanced services for its 60 student participants.

WESTSIDE COMMUNITY GRANTS

In 2024, the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation launched the Westside Community Grant Initiative, a place-based approach to philanthropy that provides funding to strengthen nonprofit organizations serving Salt Lake City's westside neighborhoods. In the first year of this initiative, the Miller Family Foundation provided 38 grants to support community based solutions across health, education, economic mobility and cultural enrichment, ensuring this vital part of Utah's capital city continues to thrive.



NEIGHBORWORKS

Neighborworks provides opportunities for individuals and families facing educational and socioeconomic barriers to build sustainable careers. A \$50,000 grant from the Miller Family Foundation supported their YouthWorks and CareerWorks programs which equip participants with the skills, confidence and access to mentorship enabling them to thrive professionally and personally.

CLUB ABILITY

Club Ability is expanding access to STEM education for underserved students across Utah. Through its Westside Tech Creators program, the organization bridges the digital divide by providing high-quality instruction in digital literacy, programming, 3D design, and more. With support from the Miller Family Foundation, Club Ability expanded the program to additional schools on the Westside.



EMPOWERING YOUTH THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

Hartland Community 4 Youth and Families is providing programming that creates opportunities for service and leadership for some of Salt Lake County's most at-risk and underserved youth. The Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation provided a \$15,000 grant, which funded a series of six community-led clean up efforts of the Jordan River Trail system, which runs through several of Salt Lake City's westside neighborhoods. The clean up efforts were led by youth, fostering both environmental stewardship and leadership skills.



HEALTH AND MEDICINE

We enrich lives by improving access to affordable and quality health care, medicine and community health systems.

CHILDREN'S CENTER UTAH

The opening of the **Children's Center** Mental Health Campus in West Valley City marked a transformative step in providing best-in-class mental health services for Utah's youngest children. As a statewide hub for childhood mental health services, the campus enhances access to care and expands clinical capacity. With support from the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation, this state-of-the-art facility served approximately 2,000 families in 2024 and provided:

NOURISHING HEALTH

The University of Utah **Rose Park Clinic** is a student-run clinic working to support the westside communities of Salt Lake City. Funding from the The Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation directly supported their “Food Pharmacy” program, which ensures families in the neighborhood have access to fresh, nutritious food along with personalized health coaching and other resources to promote wellness. In 2024, the Food Pharmacy’s mobile trailer reached over 183 families.



PEOPLE'S HEALTH CLINIC OF PARK CITY

The **People's Health Clinic** is a volunteer-driven, community-supported nonprofit providing free, high-quality health care to uninsured residents of Summit and Wasatch Counties. Serving a diverse population—88% of whom identify as Latino—the clinic plays a vital role in addressing health disparities for those ineligible for government programs. With support from the Miller Family Foundation, the clinic expanded access to care and served more than 3,000 community members in 2024.



SHELTER AND FOOD SECURITY

We enrich lives by increasing sustainable access to housing, food and other basic needs while also addressing the root causes of poverty.

SEASON OF SERVICE

The annual Miller family and Larry H. Miller Company Thanksgiving dinner and resource fair, now in its 26th year, took place at the Salt Palace in November. It brought community partners and company volunteers together to serve over 5,000 meals to individuals and families experiencing homelessness and food insecurity. The event's resource fair connected attendees with 23 partner organizations, offering everything from basic needs assistance, such as haircuts and dental services, to criminal record expungements and, for the first time ever, eye exams.

BUILDING STABLE FOUNDATIONS

Organizations like **Switchpoint** are leading the way in creating and implementing long-term solutions that address the root causes of housing instability. In 2024, the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation donated \$1 million to Switchpoint's Fairpark Housing project on the west side of Salt Lake City. This donation helped create much needed affordable housing and wraparound services, such as health care, case management and daily living support, for seniors ages 55 and older experiencing homelessness.



STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES

The **Christian Center of Park City (CCPC)** is committed to supporting individuals and families through food assistance, housing support, mental health counseling, and crisis services. With funding from the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation, CCPC expanded its food pantries, serving over 5,000 individuals, increased mental health counseling sessions by 25%, and strengthened its 13-year partnership with the Goshute Tribe, providing monthly food deliveries and gardening classes to support community well-being.

TEEN LIVING CENTER

In 2024, the **Davis Education Foundation** celebrated the completion of its Teen Living Center, a 16-bed facility providing critical support for students experiencing homelessness in the Davis School District. With support from the Miller Family Foundation, this center offers a safe place to sleep, along with access to showers, laundry, food and school supplies—helping students focus on their education and well-being. With more than 1,300 students facing homelessness in the district, the Teen Living Center is a vital resource.

EDUCATION AND SKILL DEVELOPMENT

We enrich lives by increasing access to quality education and ensuring every student has a pathway to a stable and fulfilling life.



PROMISING FUTURES

Support from the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation drove the launch of Promise Baby and You, a new initiative of **Promise Partnership Utah**. Designed for parents and caregivers of children ages 0-3, Promise Baby and You provides essential parenting skills while fostering a strong community of support in South Salt Lake and Millcreek, where nearly 5% of the population is under age 5. Promise Baby and You further connects families to vital resources, including mental health support, school readiness assessments, and other developmental tools.

BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF UTAH COUNTY

In 2024, the **Boys & Girls Club of Utah County** recognized the need to rebuild its Provo clubhouse, a community fixture since the 1960s that provides essential programming for children ages 3-18. The Miller Family Foundation contributed \$250,000 to support this effort, ensuring the Clubhouse remains a vital space for 200-300 kids each day. The new facility will also serve as the headquarters for all Club programs and services, enabling staff to support more than 90,000 individuals.



BUILDING BRIDGES THROUGH EDUCATION

For over 60 years, **Guadalupe Center** has been a beacon of opportunity for children and families living in Salt Lake City's westside community, providing early childhood, elementary and adult education, along with wraparound family support services. In 2024, the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation donated \$200,000 to expand the Center's Out of School Time program, which serves 465 students after school and during the summer.



MILLER ENRICHMENT SCHOLARSHIP AT THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

For more than two decades, the Larry H. and Gail Miller Enrichment Scholarship has empowered first-generation college students, providing the support they need to stay in school and succeed. For many students, this full-ride scholarship has meant the difference between dropping out and achieving their dreams—whether that's getting into medical school, securing a career in tech or simply having the time to focus on their education instead of juggling multiple jobs.

THE GREG AND HEIDI MILLER SINGLE PARENT SCHOLARSHIP

The Greg and Heidi Miller Single Parent Scholarship supports single parents at the University of Utah, helping them pursue education, increase earning potential, and access new career pathways. The program fosters a strong sense of community among participants, offering students facing similar experiences a chance to connect and encourage one another. In 2023-2024, seven students participated in the cohort. On behalf of Greg and Heidi Miller, the foundation contributed financial support for the scholarships, which includes tuition, a living stipend and mentorship.

JOBS AND ECONOMIC SELF-RELIANCE

We enrich lives by improving economic mobility and opportunity for individuals and families through access to job training, career development and financial or digital services.

NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE

For over 130 years, *Neighborhood House* has been a trusted pillar of support for Utah families, offering accessible, high-quality childcare and adult day services to low-income households. Funding from the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation enabled Neighborhood House to offer childcare services at sliding scale fees, removing financial barriers and ensuring families have access to exceptional care. Without sliding scale options, childcare costs can consume up to 25% of a family's annual income, but with these reduced fees, Neighborhood House provides top-tier care for as low as 7% of a family's income.



UPWARD MOBILITY THROUGH TECHNICAL EDUCATION

The Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation is expanding access to technical education with a \$1 million donation to **Ogden-Weber Technical College's** new Pathway Building. This facility will expand hands-on training opportunities, equipping students with the skills needed for high-demand careers. The Miller Family Foundation supports technical education, creating pathways to economic mobility and strengthening local industries.



INVESTING IN UTAH'S WORKFORCE

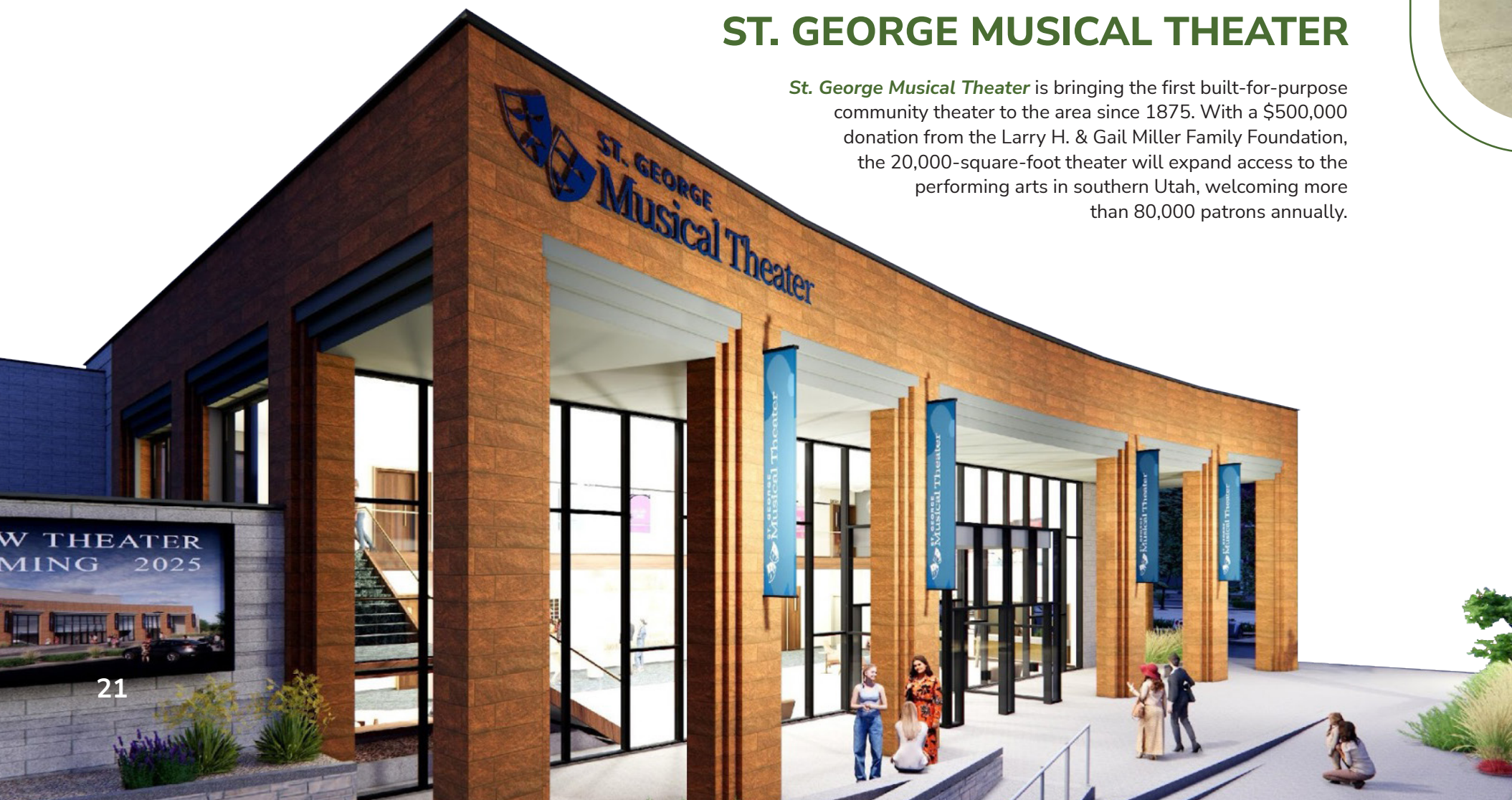
Access to quality health care starts with a strong, well-trained workforce. In partnership with **Proxima Careers**, the Miller Family Foundation is helping Utahns enter and advance in critical healthcare roles. A \$1 million investment from the Miller Family Foundation provides dedicated navigators who connect aspiring professionals with scholarships, training and career support—addressing workforce shortages while creating life-changing opportunities for individuals and families.

CULTURAL AND SPIRITUAL ENRICHMENT

We enrich lives by advancing cultural and spiritual vibrancy in the communities where we live, work and play.

ST. GEORGE MUSICAL THEATER

St. George Musical Theater is bringing the first built-for-purpose community theater to the area since 1875. With a \$500,000 donation from the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation, the 20,000-square-foot theater will expand access to the performing arts in southern Utah, welcoming more than 80,000 patrons annually.





PRESERVING HERITAGE AND CREATING COMMUNITY

St. Mary Ethiopian Orthodox Tewahedo Church of Utah (EOC) is a cornerstone of support for Utah's Ethiopian and Eritrean communities, providing essential services that foster cultural connection, spiritual growth, and community well-being. Focusing on language, youth programs and social services, the church empowers individuals and families to thrive while preserving their rich heritage. With support from the Stirling Foundation, the Derek and Shelaine Maxfield Family Foundation, the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation, and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, the EOC will have a new meeting house that will serve the community for generations to come.

REVITALIZING THE RIVER

The *Jordan River Foundation* is dedicated to revitalizing and protecting the Jordan River Parkway, ensuring that this vital natural resource remains a thriving space for community recreation and connection. The Miller Family Foundation provided a grant that supported the 2024 Get to the River Festival, connecting thousands of families with activities on the river and informing them on the importance of the Jordan River ecosystem.



NEXT-GENERATION GIVING

At the heart of philanthropy is the principle of **stewardship**—the responsibility to thoughtfully nurture and sustain resources for the benefit of others. As stewards of the philanthropic legacy started by Larry and Gail, the next generation of the Miller family embraces this responsibility through the **Miller Legacy Project**, which empowers family members ages 12 and older to engage in hands-on giving.

Led by the family's Giving and Service Committee, the initiative fosters generosity through board service, volunteerism, and grant nominations. Focused on mentorship, service, and strategic giving, the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation brings generations together to enrich the community and ensure philanthropy evolves to meet future needs. In 2024, 100% of eligible family members participated in the Miller Legacy Project, with 41 third-generation members and six fourth-generation members researching, nominating and selecting organizations to support.

BUILDING CURIOSITY

Each year, approximately 2.8 million people visit **Thanksgiving Point**, a hub for education and exploration. Among its most popular attractions is the Museum of Natural Curiosity, where families come to learn and play. During a visit, Alyssa Wardle, a third-generation family member, saw firsthand the need for renovations in the infant and toddler area. Inspired by Alyssa's experiences visiting with her children, 21 family members united through the Miller Legacy Project to provide a \$325,000 grant to support much-needed renovations to the museum, using funds from the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation.

HEARSEE MOBILITY

Carisa Miller participated in the Miller Legacy Project by supporting **HearSee Mobility**, a St. George-based organization serving the blind and low-vision community. She helped fundraise for the organization and executed Utah's first Blackout Banquet, a low-light dining experience that raised awareness of visual impairment.



PAWS-ITIVE IMPACT

The **Humane Society of Utah** finds loving homes for an average of 7,000 animals each year. In 2024, third- and fourth-generation Miller family members, Lauren T. Miller and Emili Miller, chose to support this mission through the Miller Legacy Project on behalf of the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation. Their combined contributions helped cover adoption fees for 88 long-stay pets.

TRUSTEE-DIRECTED INITIATIVES

The Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation is committed to issues and institutions our trustees care deeply about, including mental and physical wellness, youth development, community groups, housing security, and more. Our trustees' commitment goes beyond funding—they are hands-on leaders, serving on boards and staying actively involved in the communities we serve.



MAKING WAVES AND BREAKING BARRIERS

The *National Ability Center (NAC)* empowers individuals of all abilities by building self-esteem, confidence and lifelong skills through sport, recreation and education. From adaptive water skiing and challenge courses to wheelchair-friendly whitewater rafting, NAC is making outdoor recreation more inclusive. With trustee-directed support, the center expanded access to its 20+ programs.

THE SHARING PLACE

The Sharing Place provides a safe environment for grieving families to share their feelings while healing themselves. With trustee-directed funding, The Sharing Place was able to facilitate 24 group grief support sessions.



THE INN BETWEEN HOUSE

The INN Between House provides medical respite and end-of-life care for individuals experiencing homelessness. Trustee support helped provide critical services to 200+ individuals.

SPY HOP

Spy Hop combines youth development and arts education to equip young people with digital media skills. Trustee-directed funding expanded the Media Arts Outreach program, reaching over 6,500 youth annually, with a focus on rural Utah counties.



GOOD TIME GOLF

Good Time Golf creates a safe, sober space for individuals in recovery from substance abuse and mental health challenges to connect and heal through golf. With trustee support, they expanded their programming to include cold-weather offerings.



PHILANTHROPY DAY

Utah's philanthropic community gathered at the 2024 philanthropy session of the Larry H. Miller Summit in October to explore how large-scale change happens, the power of collaboration and the ways organizations across the state are working to maximize their impact. A key feature of the session was the Collaboration Exchange, where participants identified the resources they could offer and the support they needed. These responses were later compiled into a digital catalog, providing attendees with a shared tool to strengthen connections and amplify their philanthropic efforts.

The keynote speaker, Debra Schwartz, managing director of impact investments at the MacArthur Foundation, shared her insights on how to create meaningful impact through scale that she's learned over a career of working with nonprofits.

A highlight of the philanthropy session was a fireside chat between Gail Miller and two of her grandchildren, Sharen Miller and Bryce Miller. Together, they discussed the lessons Gail has learned over decades of philanthropic leadership and her advice for the next generation of family philanthropists.
